MERTON 100: Living the Legacy

The Fourteenth General Meeting of the International Thomas Merton Society

Bellarmine University – Louisville, KY – June 4-7, 2015

In June 2015 the International Thomas Merton Society will hold its Fourteenth General Meeting in Louisville, KY, on the campus of Bellarmine University. Founded in 1950, Bellarmine University is a coeducational institution with undergraduate and graduate studies in the liberal arts and sciences and professional programs. It is the home of the Thomas Merton Center, the official repository of Merton's literary estate.

Featured participants in the conference include:

- Rt. Rev. Rowan Williams, Baron Williams of Oystermouth, is an Anglican bishop, poet and theologian. He was the 104th Archbishop of Canterbury from December 2002 to December 2012 and is now Master of Magdalene College, Cambridge University. He is the author of numerous books including A Silent Action: Engagements with Thomas Merton.
- **Christine M. Bochen** is a founding member and past president of ITMS. She has taught Merton in a variety of settings, as well as edited a volume of Merton's journals, several volumes of Merton's letters, and an anthology of Merton's writings; she has also co-authored, with William H. Shannon and Patrick O'Connell, The Thomas Merton Encyclopedia.
- James Finley was a monk at the Abbey of Gethsemani in Kentucky, where Thomas Merton was his spiritual director. He is a clinical psychologist in private practice and leads retreats and workshops throughout the United States and Canada. He is the author of *Merton's Palace of Nowhere* among other books.
- Rev. Bryan N. Massingale teaches social ethics with a focus on Catholic Social Teaching, liberation theologies, African American religious ethics, and racial justice at Marquette University. He has served as President of the Catholic Theological Society and Convener of the Black Catholic Theological Symposium and served as a consultant to the U.S. Catholic Conference of Bishops, on issues such as criminal justice, capital punishment, environmental justice, and affirmative action. He is the author of Racial Justice and the Catholic Church.
- David J. Belcastro is Professor of Religious Studies at Capital University in Columbus, OH. He is a co-editor of *The Merton Annual* and President of the International Thomas Merton Society.

Many other Merton scholars will also be participating in concurrent sessions and workshops, including a panel on Thomas Merton and Interfaith Dialogue.

Registration fee is \$290.00 for ITMS members (\$350.00 for non-members; for information on ITMS membership, see within). Campus dormitory lodging is \$150.00; arrangements can be made for those who need to arrive Wednesday evening or stay over Sunday evening (see additional lodging fee). All fees must be included with completed form.
